Subject Name: Drama

- develop an ambitious sense of curiosity through the exploration stimulus material;
- develop co-operation, kindness & collaboration;
- develop confidence in communication through developing vocal and physical skills;
- explore social issues though drama to develop tolerance and understanding;
- be exposed to different peoples' perspectives and emotions on issues and events;
- study the history and influence of different practitioners on drama;
- develop an ability to respond to and interpret texts from a variety of genres, styles and contexts.
- develop an understanding of how to apply and analyse different stylistic qualities such as Realism, Physical theatre, Epic theatre and Surrealism;
- develop an ability to evaluate their own and others' work, always demonstrating respect and empathy
