### **Dear Parents and Carers**

I'm proud to be the Headteacher of Queen Elizabeth's School. Our students are truly wonderful and have worked incredibly hard to achieve their best this term. The whole team at QE knows that the school is the heartbeat of the community here in mid Devon and that the connection that a student feels towards school and the wider experiences that come with being part of a school stays with them for life.

We have finished the term this week with rewards and celebration assemblies. It is inspiring and uplifting to meet with students who love learning and have worked with dedication and enthusiasm across their subjects. Our students already display huge potential to be talented scientists, historians, engineers and creative professionals. Our good citizens awards illustrate how students across all year groups are willing to participate and positively support others in the daily life of the school. In the summer term students will notice visitors on-site looking at our accommodation. The aim is to develop an ambitious 10-year masterplan for the school premises. After many decades of on-going discussion about the QE sites and buildings, it is now time to plan and implement the necessary improvements to the school's infrastructure. The Ted Wragg Multi Academy Trust will shortly be inviting multi-disciplinary teams to tender for services to develop an ambitious improvement and/or rebuild scheme for QE.

The remit for this will be to:

- Provide safe, secure and inspiring spaces for students and staff.
- Respect the character and heritage of the school, and its place at the heart of the Crediton community.
- Develop a high quality, coherent environment that facilitates subject collaboration.
- Provide a stimulating learning environment with reduced environmental impact providing compliant, environmentally friendly spaces, fit for future generations.
- Being cost effective: high levels of amenity for learning and appropriate support spaces.

The purpose of this work is to identify solutions for the redevelopment of QE that will address significant building condition needs and consider realistic options for bringing together the existing campuses into a single facility. Proposals will include the phasing of plan recommendations, ensuring that developments are correctly prioritised. A key part of the masterplan development will involve substantial engagement with all members of the school community including students, staff, governors, parents and wider community. We will provide an update on the next steps during the summer term.

Wishing all of our families a Happy Easter break and we look forward to welcoming students back to school on the 17th April.



## World Book Day




QE's Barnfield campus students held a contest to decorate their tutor room doors in honour of World Book Day. Victoria Hopkins Bond, Director of English and Performing Arts, said "It was fantastic to see the different approaches each tutor group took to this competition: some decided to create a display on a book they've read together in our Tutor Group Guided Reading programme; others decided to focus on displaying each student's favourite book. Whatever approach they chose, each tutor group demonstrated excellent teamwork which was impressive to see."

First prize was awarded to tutor group 7N for their depiction of 'The Gruffalo'. Second place went to 80 for their interpretation of 'The Revolver', and 7C's 'The London Eye' (and other favourite books) took third place.















## Science in Action

British Science Week's theme this year was 'Connections' and our Year 7 students were given a demonstration on the products of combustion. The experiment enabled students to see the link between the burning of fossil fuels and the production of acid rain and greenhouse gases (water and carbon dioxide).

# The Ballad of Maria Marten



On International Women's Day it was fitting that one of our Year 11 GCSE Drama groups performed two extracts from the very moving and incredibly relevant play: The Ballad of Maria Marten.

This a real-life story set in 1827; the story of a woman, murdered, she is usually presented as a victim in melodramatic retellings which focus on the murderer, the man and who he was, rather than the murdered.

This wonderful adaptation by Beth Flintoff of the story originally performed by the renowned Eastern Angles Theatre Company, however, gives the voice to the silenced: Maria Marten.

This version enables us to hear the voice of Maria as she tells us precisely what happened to her, how things unfolded leading to her murder, but also shows us the joy and love between girls as children and friends, as young women and reminds us we all have a voice and it's our right to use it, to say: this is me, I am worthy and my voice is important. On a day where we celebrate women, we stand together celebrating achievement and progress, but recognise there still is a need to close the gender divide and that there is still a very tangible gap.

The story our students share today as part of their GCSE exam is a powerful reminder that when we stand together, we don't lose our identity as individuals, but we indeed gain strength:

"My hands are shaking.

I'll stand with you.

Me too.

And me.

Me too.

Me too. Let's do it together."



















## **Essential Pizza**



Most recently, as part of the scheme, the students attended a series of workshops at Exeter College.









## **Everyday Maths**



Congratulations to two of our Year 13 students who have received offers to study at Cambridge university!


Scout Sansom has received an offer to study Geography at Girton College, while Rebecca Millar has an offer to study Natural Sciences at Homerton College.

## **Home Learning Review Update**





Many thanks to those of you who completed the Forms questionnaire sent in the Autumn Term and to interested parents who attended the meeting this term. I have included the key points from the questionnaire below, which have shown the majority of responses were 'in the middle' for most questions. With regards to the feedback from the meeting, a couple of points were raised that I am currently working on to implement in September. The Knowledge Organisers for Learning Cycle 3 had already gone to print so no changes could be made this year. Key points raised:

- 1. To ensure that the time for SPARX Maths is clearly allocated in the Home Learning expectations
- 2. The Knowledge Organisers have more structured tasks for students to complete each week
- 3. Links and advice for parents on where they can look to support their children more at home

The vast majority of our students are engaging well in Home Learning tasks and using them effectively to support their school work. Any completed, do receive merits and systems are in place for them to be able to spend these Rewards next term.







## **Parent and Carer Survey**



We would like to thank everyone who participated in our January Parent and Carer Survey.

Your feedback provides us with a valuable insight into the things we are doing well and the things that we could improve from a parent perspective. Our job is to then ensure that your feedback to the school has an impact. We have analysed the results of the survey, and the key messages are as follows.

### **Successes**

- 87% of parents said that their child took part in extra curricular clubs or activities at school
- 85% said there is a good range of subjects on offer to study
- 71% said their child had no experience of bullying (this is above the national figure)
- If their child had experienced bullying parents felt it was dealt with quickly and effectively (which compares favourably with other Trust schools)
- Parents feel well informed about academic progress

### Areas to further develop

- 76% would like further suggestions to support learning and development (reflecting positive parent engagement and a point for future action)
- 74% expressed that the school has high expectations (Trust slightly higher)
- Parents would like more information about social development (relationships and respect for each other)

### In response to your feedback on areas to improve, we are now working on the following

- Improve level of expectation of students particularly around homework
- Parents evenings explore a mixed programme of on-line and face to face meetings that cover academic and social development of students
- A well communicated anti-bullying strategy that is well understood by students and parents









## **Mobile Phones**



You will remember that as of January this year we have been asking all students across all year groups to have their phones 'off and away' during the school day.

It is also useful to remember why we put these rules in place. To protect young people.

When we asked students about these issues, this is what they reported to us:

32% of students have received unkind or abusive messages – 400 students

23% of students have received unkind or abusive messages from a stranger – 300 students

28% of students have received unkind or abusive messages from a friend! - 350 students

18% have received unkind or abusive messages in school – 210 students

27% have had false information shared about them - 350 students

25% have been involved in an incident in school which started on-line - 300 students

31% know someone who has shared an inappropriate image of themselves – 370 students

We had several serious incidents at the start of the year involving mobile phones and social media. These incidents impacted a large number of students and in some cases they still are. This along with our students feedback we decided to make this change.

Whilst we recognise that mobile phones and social media are part of our modern lives, we are also acutely aware of the need to make school a safe space for all young people to come and learn and grow. Without the fear of what might be happening on-line.

How a day without phones can benefit your child:

- 1 Reduce anxiety and stress
- 2 Help with concentration and focus
- 3 Supports better mental health
- 4 Supports healthier and stronger relationships
- 5 Supports keeping you safe and feeling safe
